Best Places to Work Methodology

• Selection process

The Boston Business Journal's Best Places to Work was compiled through a survey conducted by Quantum Market Research. Employees of nominated companies were asked to complete a 38-question, online survey that uses a scale of 1 to 6 (from "strongly disagree" to "strongly agree") for each question. Categories include work environment, work-life balance, job satisfaction, advancement opportunities, management, compensation and benefits.

Participating companies needed a minimum level of employee participation, based on the number of employees in Massachusetts, to be considered as an honoree.

Once the required number of surveys were completed, the scores were averaged for each question and an overall score was calculated for each company. The companies were divided into three categories – small companies, midsize companies and large companies – based on number of employees. The 20 companies with the highest scores in each category won Best Places to Work honors.
